ADULT DAY CARE PROGRAM: Santa Clara Pueblo Regional Adult Day Care Center (ADC) is committed to providing a caring and secure environment where the elderly and disabled are treated with the upmost dignity and compassion.

The program is set up to care for adults with special needs and those who would benefit from participating in activities that stimulate both the mind and the body.

The Santa Clara Pueblo Regional Adult Day Care Program is available to all eligible individuals from Santa Clara Pueblo, individuals from the surrounding Eight Northern Pueblos and from the local/Espanola community at large.

ADC has collaborated with the Senior Center to sponsor a Super Bowl Game Day, St. Patrick's Dance along with San Ildefonso Seniors and the Espanola ADC, ADC and San Ildefonso Senior Center collaborated to have a Mother's Day Bingo and barbeque. Our Fourth of July barbeque and game day was awesome, with a special tribute to Mrs. Maggie Salazar, who celebrated her 101 birthday. Many more activities and trips have been planned throughout this coming year.

ADC is currently taking applications for new clients; the daily program consists of exercise and activities that stimulate both body and mind. Both structured and unstructured activities are utilized to provide a broad framework where elders with varying needs, including Alzheimer's and dementia, can successfully function.

The CHR/Diabetes Staff (Florence Coriz, Denise Chavarria, Allayne Martinez-Until July, Michelle Tafoya) has been busy with routine activities such as home visits to the community members, advocate on behalf of community members, ordering/picking up medication at Santa Fe Indian Hospital (since the Pharmacy was closed since September 2, 2024 at the Clinic), transports (Reminder: 5 days in advance) to Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Espanola and Los Alamos.

In between daily schedules all staff attended our Annual Diabetes Conference in August in Albuquerque, our Annual CHW Conference in October, Monthly Meeting/trainings, Quarterly Meetings (CHR-Albuquerque Area Southwest Tribal Epidemiology-AASTEC) meetings/trainings on line to keep up certifications)

We had a busy schedule this past summer with the Department of Youths Summer Program with several sessions of nutritional classes with Ms. Diane Phillips, IHS Nutritionist:

Cut Down on added sugars

Making healthy snacks for kids-Energy Balls with rolled oats, peanut butter, honey, chocolate chips

Breakfast fruit parfaits-yogurt, peaches, raspberries, blueberries, granola, strawberries, bananas

Santa Clara Pueblo

Office of Emergency Management

The Emergency Management office is comprised of four employees: James F. Baca, Emergency Management Director, Rayeandrea Gutierrez, Emergency Management Technician, Brandon BigCrow, Emergency Management Administrative Assistant and Melissa Dishta, Emergency Management Administrative Assistant. The Emergency Management department was formed in 2011 after the Las Conchas Fire and subsequent floods in the Santa Clara Pueblo Canyon. The goal of the department is to maintain situational awareness, be proactive and to protect the life, safety and welfare for the Santa Clara Pueblo. The departments responsibilities include:

- Planning, Training, Response and Recovery from all man made and nature caused emergencies/events within the Pueblo Boundaries to include:
 - Fires
 - Floods
 - Traffic Crashes
 - Gas Leaks/Outages
 - Power Outages
 - Pandemics



In the late evening hours of June 20, 2024, the Pueblo experienced flooding we haven't seen since 2012. There is documented damage from the Irrigation Diversion all the way back to Third Pond. Parts of the road are completely missing, and parts of the hill side have come down onto the road in other locations. After the Pueblo completed a preliminary reconnaissance of the damage, it was decided in the interest of Public Safety, the canyon would be closed. This recon also prompted the Pueblo to seek a Federal Disaster Declaration through the Federal Emergency Management Agency based on damages observed.

On August 20, 2024 President Joe Biden signed Presidential Disaster Declaration DR-4809-NM, declaring a disaster in Santa Clara Pueblo, NM. Currently FEMA and the Pueblo are working on project worksheets which will identify the work that will be completed. Once this process is complete, the Pueblo should be able to move into the construction phase. This will hopefully happen in the Spring of 2025. Reestablishing the road into the canyon will be top priority and once this is completed other work will begin.



Even with the current disaster the Office of Emergency Management is still currently working on several projects. The first project involved the revision of the current All Hazards Mitigation Plan. This plan will help the Pueblo focus on mitigation specific projects for the next five (5) years. Most of the projects contained in the revision deal with work that needs to be completed post fire/flooding. The second project, once completed with the HMP, will be to work on a Threat and Hazard Identification Risk Assessment (THIRA). This assessment will help the Pueblo to identify the threats and hazards that pose the most danger. One completed, the THIRA will work hand in hand with the HMP and will help the Pueblo to make decision on its path



forward with recovery. Finally, OEM is also working on revisions to the Emergency Operations Plan and the Pandemic Plans. Once these are completed they will also be incorporated into the documents the Pueblo will use for emergency response.

The Department's primary focus was on emergency response during the COVID-19 Pandemic; however, the department was still responsible for the Pueblo's response to any and all man-made/natural disasters in the Pueblo. There were a lot of lessons learned during the pandemic which will be added to the Emergency Operations Plan. Also, we continue to monitor the conditions in the canyon and throughout the Pueblo. We have assisted in the implementation of short- and long-term recovery projects in the Pueblo's watershed from the source, down to the confluence of the Rio Grande River.

Now to introduce the staff who manage the Office of Emergency Management for the Pueblo:

Hello my name is James Baca. I am currently the Emergency Management Director. I have been in this position since February 2021. Prior to the position I was the elected Lieutenant Governor and Tribal Sheriff. During my time as the Tribal Sheriff, I oversaw OEM, and this is where I gained the majority of my experience with Emergency Management. Since taking over as the Director in 2021 I have been in the capacity of the Incident Commander (IC). I was placed in as the IC for COVID-19 response for the Pueblo in March of 2021. The Pueblo rescinded all COVID-19 restrictions on February 23, 2024. More recently I was placed in as the IC for the flooding the Canyon and Pueblo experienced on June 20, 2024. Since that time I have been working with FEMA Region 6 to document all damages in the Pueblo, working on approving damage descriptions and ensuring all documentation is sent up to the Region for the disaster. I will continue to contribute items needed to ensure the Pueblo is able to recover from this disaster.

My name is Rayeandrea Gutierrez, I have been working with the Emergency Management Department for the past 13 years. I transferred over from the Santa Clara Police Department and started off as the Administrative Assistant. I left for a brief time to work as the Office Manager/Registrar at KCS. I came back to the Emergency Management Department 3 years ago and was hired on as the Administrative Assistant. I also served as the Safety Officer for the COVID Response Team while working with Emergency Management. I am now currently the Emergency Management Technician. During the June flooding event, I was selected to be the Deputy Incident Commander for the Emergency Operations Center. I enjoy working with the Emergency Management Department and helping the community of Santa Clara Pueblo.

Hello, my name is Melissa Dishta I am currently the Administrative Assistant for the Office Of Emergency Management. I have a total of about 14 years with the Pueblo of Santa Clara. I started my employment with Law Enforcement as a dispatcher. I am fairly new to my current position, and I am looking forward to gaining more experience and knowledge as I am adjusting to my new role in the Emergency Management office.

Hello, My name is Brandon BigCrow. I am currently employed with the Office of Emergency Management as an Administrative Assistant. I've worked for the pueblo for little more than a year now. I started with Law Enforcement as a Conservation Officer but moved over to my current position. I am learning a lot from this current position and gaining valuable experience in this field of work. On another note, if you are **requesting wood** to be delivered, please understand that you must meet the requirements by being 65 years of age and older and once you do get your wood, you cannot order another wood order until you have waited 3 weeks. This gives our Forestry Department enough time to work on the wood orders for all. Thank you for your understanding!

Tax Administration Department

The Santa Clara Pueblo Tax Administration Department handles all business licensing and tax collection and reconciliation for the Pueblo. We are tasked with enforcement of the tribal Tax Code and the Regulation of Business and Commerce Code.

The office staff consists of Office Manager, Desiree Ramirez and Tax Administrator George Marquez. They can answer any questions you might have about operating a business on Santa Clara Pueblo lands.

During the course of the past year, the tax department with the consent and approval of the Tax Commission, has presented several amendments to both the Tax Code and the Regulation of Business and Commerce Code. The amendments were proposed to clarify which classification of business license a person or company would need. Which vendors would qualify for exemptions from registering their business and paying gross receipts taxes. And finally, of course, some changes were proposed to increase revenue.

Enforcement of the codes is an important part of the office duties. Some companies believe they are exempt or are entitled to extensions to file required forms or to pay tax amounts due. We are here to inform those companies their interpretations are incorrect.

Why inflexibility? Because the revenue raised belongs to the community. The tribal Council disperses it to various community programs from activities for our children to programs for our seniors. The tax office is charged with collecting money due to the Pueblo.



Trainings and Tsunamis

In the beginning of December, the Department of Youth and Learning (DYL) staff went to Sausalito, California to get certified as Wilderness First Responders. This five-day course taught us how to support people in outdoor settings “where access to medical care is delayed or communication is unreliable” and we learned “about the essential principles of wilderness medicine, how to perform a comprehensive physical examination, gather critical patient history, and evaluate vital signs-crucial elements of proficient wilderness medical care”

(nols.edu). On this training, we learned how to splint injuries, got CPR certified and participated in a night scenario.

These scenarios were the main teaching

techniques during the training. Participants played the roles of “patient” and “rescuers” whose main job was to gather as much information as they could to make the best possible decisions for the “patient” and decide on treatment and or an evacuation plan. We learned how to complete spinal assessments and how to reduce dislocations when in a wilderness context, meaning we can *only* do this when we are more than one hour from definitive care such as a hospital. Our staff is now better prepared for our youth activities like the RezRiders program where we take them out into wilderness settings to go rafting, snowboarding and rock climbing. It is exciting that this certification gives us the confidence and knowledge to develop more outdoor programming such as hiking and camping. There was so much learning that occurred on this trip, and we are excited to have participated in this training for the youth of our community. While



the days were long, we couldn't complain because our training site was right next to the Pacific Ocean on Rodeo Beach, and we could see the Golden Gate Bridge every morning. However, on Thursday, Dec 5th at 10:51 AM, in the middle of one our scenarios we did get a small scare when we received the “tsunami warning” on our phones. Our instructors paused our scenarios and gathered us in a circle to discuss our plan of action. We were located at the Nature Bridge Campus in the Golden Gate National Park Area and their staff instructed us to move toward a safe zone, a 5-minute walk inland to higher ground. We waited an hour for the tsunami to “hit,” during which, we were able to move our

vehicles to a parking lot that was located on higher ground as well and have lunch. After about an hour the tsunami warning was cancelled, and we went on with our training. Our instructors and onsite staff of the National Park were very watchful and careful with the decisions they made to keep us calm and safe. They did not see the need to evacuate the area

since the earthquake that triggered the tsunami was very far from us. Even the news in California stated that, “We need to work hard at reducing unnecessary alerts...it was kind of crazy having a tsunami warning in place for so long” (nbcnews.com). We would like to thank Delores Allison, Mel Tafoya and Jeremy Oyenque for checking in on us during this time. We were happy to be back in New Mexico!!

'Tis the Season to Get Vaccinated

Department of Health urges New Mexicans to get shots

SANTA FE – One place you don't want to be during the holiday season is in the hospital. Fortunately, it's not too late to get vaccinated so you can share memories and joy, rather than a virus, with your loved ones.

“As we approach a season filled with celebration, we're also entering a time when flu, COVID, RSV, and other respiratory illnesses are spreading,” said **Miranda Durham** New Mexico Department of Health's (NMDOH) Chief Medical Officer. “Getting vaccinated against these winter viruses is about protecting yourself and safeguarding those around you.”

Vaccine recommendations:

- Everyone six months and older can still get this season's flu and COVID-19 vaccines.
- One dose of RSV vaccine is recommended for everyone 75 and older and for those 60 and older with medical conditions like diabetes, lung or heart disease.
- RSV, COVID-19 and flu vaccines are recommended for pregnant people.
- To protect infants from severe RSV, maternal vaccination or infant immunization with nirsevimab is recommended.

Facts about respiratory viruses:

- Monitoring [wastewater viral activity](#) is one of the most accurate ways to track COVID-19 according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Current CDC data shows very high COVID-19 activity in New Mexico wastewater.
- Nursing homes are high-risk environments for respiratory viruses, and vaccines are recommended for all residents. Currently, [only 32% of nursing home residents](#) in New Mexico have gotten a COVID-19 vaccine this season.
- Hospitalization risk from COVID-19 and flu goes up dramatically with age, putting our elders at risk.
- About 9 out of 10 adults hospitalized with COVID-19 last season were behind on vaccines.
- Less than half of infants in their first RSV season are immunized, despite RSV being a leading cause of hospitalization in young children.

To schedule vaccinations statewide, insured adults can contact their local pharmacy or primary care provider. You can find a provider locator map online at <https://vaccine.doh.nm.gov/> or call the NMDOH Helpline at 1-833-SWNURSE (833-796-8773) for assistance.

For children 18 and under, vaccines are available whether they have health insurance or not. Their vaccinations are covered by the [Vaccines for Children](#) program, so all children in New Mexico, regardless of insurance status, can be vaccinated.
