RE: State Wide Fire Restrictions – High Fire Danger

Fire Restrictions are in effect. Due to “exceptional” drought conditions and the potential for fires to spread and grow quickly, we are advising all Santa Clara Pueblo residents and visitors to adhere to the Fire Restriction Ban until further notice. The restrictions help reduce the fire risk and prevent fires during periods of high or extreme fire danger.

The increase in Fire Restrictions are being recommended to protect public health and safety along the forest, Bosque, urban-interface, cultural resources and our housing areas.

The following acts are **prohibited** on all tribal lands and roads until further notice:

1. Smoking is restricted in woodlands and vegetated areas to within vehicles equipped with ash trays. If possible clear an area of approximately 5 ft. to bare soil and water down to fully extinguish ashes in outside areas.
2. Open burning is **prohibited**, including croplands, ditches, debris, branches or weeds.
3. For over 20 years Fireworks of all types have been **banned** by Council resolution, along with fines.

Exemptions:

- a. Pressurized liquid or gas stoves, charcoal grills, meeting manufactures safety specifications are allowed and,
- b. Traditional fires, such as outdoor ovens and outdoor cooking and pottery fires are allowed. However, they must be attended to at all times along with a garden hose or bucket of water. After every pottery firing make sure pottery firing materials such as manure and wood are put in a metal container and monitored that it doesn't relight.

Santa Clara Tribal Law Enforcement along with Conservation, Public Safety Aids and the Fire Department will be enforcing these restrictions. It is important that we all work together to avoid further damage to our natural resources. The schedule below of the irrigation systems will be in effect so all individuals who irrigate will benefit from the water. Please note that water may be turned off from time to time for cleaning or during inclement weather to prevent sediment from clogging the system.

Main concrete ditch

Monday & Tuesday

People who have fields **North** of Mr. Joseph G. Naranjo and Mr. Jesse Gutierrez (Hump Road) will have use of the irrigation waters.

Wednesday

All people that have fields along the middle ditch will have use of the irrigation waters.

Thursday, Friday & Saturday

People who have fields **South** of Mr. Joseph G. Naranjo and Mr. Jesse Gutierrez (Hump Road) will have use of the irrigation waters.

Sunday

The irrigation water will be open for use by anyone desiring to irrigate.

Santa Clara Canyon Ditch

Guachupangue- Sunday Midnight to Tuesday Noon

People will have the use of the irrigation waters.

Tuesday Noon to Wednesday Noon

People who have fields between old Santa Clara Canyon head gate and Guachupangue head gate will have usage of the irrigation waters.

Wednesday Noon to Thursday Noon

People who have fields between the Guachupangue head gate, to include the Holcomb ditch, will have use of the irrigation waters.

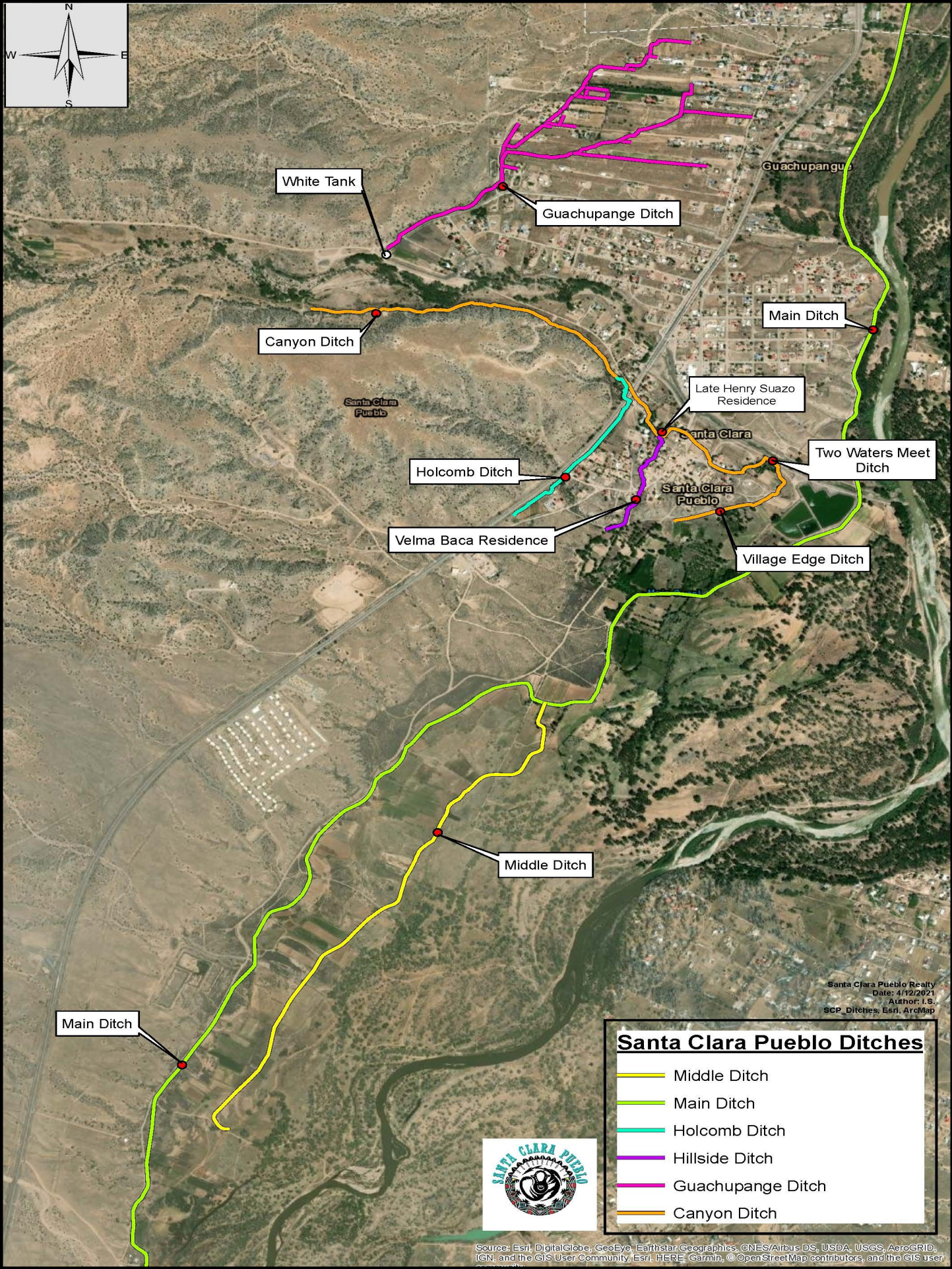
Thursday Noon to Friday Midnight

People who have fields between the Holcomb ditch, including those who have fields using the head gate by the Suazo residence (south) will have usage of the irrigation waters.

Friday Midnight to Sunday Midnight

People who have fields between the head gates by the Suazo residence, including those who use water in the bottom field east of the pueblo will have use of the irrigation waters.

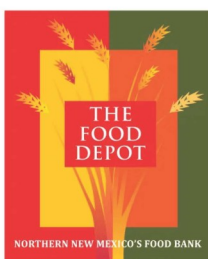

Custodial/ Maintenance Department

The Custodial and Maintenance Department is responsible for the cleaning and maintenance of the entire Tribal Administration. To accomplish this, all offices and buildings are cleaned and sanitized daily throughout the week. The Custodial and Maintenance staff work together to provide services upon request from every department in a timely manner. Scheduled cleaning is conducted by the custodial staff. Grounds keeping and maintenance is conducted by Marvin Moquino. Melvin Dishta, Janice Naranjo and Mary Quintana are the current custodians working together to keep the facilities sanitized and in top shape.

The Custodial department performs multiple duties for departments upon request. Cleaning and sanitizing of all Tribal restrooms is one of our main priorities since the Covid-19 Outbreak. Other responsibilities such as restocking restrooms with hand soap, toilet paper and paper towels are also completed daily. Trash is collected from offices and buildings and disposed of properly. We also collect trash from other buildings such as Senior Center and Adult Day Care when the dump is closed on Monday and Tuesdays. Seasonal duties that require attention such as weed clearing and debris removal are completed at all Tribal Administration buildings. The Custodians and Maintenance team together with Roads and Agriculture department on snow days for snow removal during the winter months. The custodial staff is also responsible for delivering biweekly newsletters to all tribal residents and memos that come directly from the Governors office.

The Maintenance Department is led by Marvin Moquino. The Maintenance supervisor for the Custodial department and is responsible for the upkeep of all office and buildings under the Tribal Administration including the Santa Clara Clinic. Maintenance duties under Marvin are to report and repair any concerns that are submitted from departments or staff. He addresses all maintenance-type work, unless contracting with other company vendors such as electricians, Kha’P’o Construction or whichever entities are needed to complete the task. Marvin then provides oversight to ensure these tasks are completed in a timely manner and resolve the issues raised.

The Custodial and Maintenance Department’s main directive is to continue sanitizing and cleaning to prevent any lingering spread of Covid-19. This has been our goal since the beginning of the Pandemic and is still one of the main practices done throughout the Administration Buildings. Another priority is to keep the Tribal Administration as clean as possible and provide all departments with assistance they require in a timely manner. Our Custodial Department is actively seeking one more individual for employment. We would like to hire a person to join a hard-working team and take care of the Santa Clara Community.

Celebrating a Young Voice for Environmental Justice

This month, we are proud to recognize an extraordinary achievement by one of our very own, **Rriana Frenier, a 14-year-old SFIS student** whose dedication, courage, and persistence have culminated in the publication of her powerful research article on environmental justice. After a full year of careful research, writing, and revision, her article—“*Area G and the Effects It Has on Us and the Environment*”—has been officially published. Her work sheds light on the immediate and often overlooked impacts of nuclear waste storage on Indigenous lands, surrounding communities, and vital water sources.

Her article focuses on Area G, a waste disposal site at Los Alamos National Laboratory, where radioactive materials—including transuranic waste—have been stored for decades. She explains how these materials, which include elements like plutonium and americium, pose serious long-term health risks such as cancer and organ damage, especially for children and unborn babies. Through clear and compelling research, she highlights several major concerns:

- The proximity of radioactive waste storage to residential communities and Pueblo lands
- The contamination of sacred cultural sites and aquifers, particularly affecting the Pueblo of San Ildefonso
- The risks of leaks, improper storage, and transportation accidents involving nuclear waste
- The potential for environmental disasters, such as wildfires, to spread contamination through air, soil, and water

One of the most striking points in her article is the connection between Area G and the contamination of the Rio Grande—a critical water source relied upon by approximately 16 million people across multiple states, tribal nations, and even into Mexico.

She also emphasizes the cultural and spiritual consequences of environmental damage, explaining how contaminated water disrupts traditional practices, agriculture, and ceremonies for many Pueblo communities. See full article at <https://www.ccwnewmexico.org/latestnews>

R’riana Frenier (pronounced Ar-ee-AH-na) is a 14-year-old honor roll student at Santa Fe Indian School. She is from the Pueblos of Tesuque, Jemez, and Santa Clara.

Frenier began writing about environmental issues after visiting Area G with the Communities for Clean Water (CCW) cohort in the summer of 2025. Witnessing the proximity of nearby homes to Area G and learning about its impact on the Rio Grande and surrounding Pueblo communities, inspired her to raise awareness and advocate for those who may be unaware of the issue.

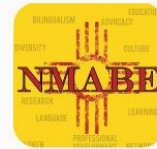
Her work reflects a strong commitment to environmental justice and amplifying Indigenous youth perspectives, influenced by the advocacy efforts of Communities for Clean Water.

She has been actively engaged in leadership and community initiatives since 2025. Frenier serves as a board member and presenter for Youth Adult Partnership (YAP) and helped organize the Youth Empowerment Action (YEA) Summit. She is also a member of the Communities for Clean Water cohort, a Girls Inc. ambassador, and currently serves on the Teen Leadership Council and with Pueblo Action Alliance.

Valles Caldera National Preserve 2026 Indigenous and Hispanic Youth Fly Fishing Experiences



Valles Caldera National Preserve 2026 Indigenous and Hispanic Youth Fly Fishing Experiences are free and all-inclusive fly fishing camps for youth between the ages of 7 - 18 years of age and who identify as Indigenous or Hispanic. These camps will take place on July 25th, July 26th, August 8th, and August 15th, 2026. Applicants will only be able to participate one day, so choose the date that works best for you. These outings are single day camps that start around 8:30 am and end around 4:00 pm. No knowledge of fly-fishing is needed. The camp will provide all gear for the participants free of charge and all entry fees will be covered. This is an all-inclusive camp that will educate the children about their culture, history, and language through the skill of fly fishing, while being guided by Indigenous and Hispanic mentors. All events will take place at Valles Caldera National Preserve in northern New Mexico. Participants will need a valid NM Fishing License if 12 years of age or older. 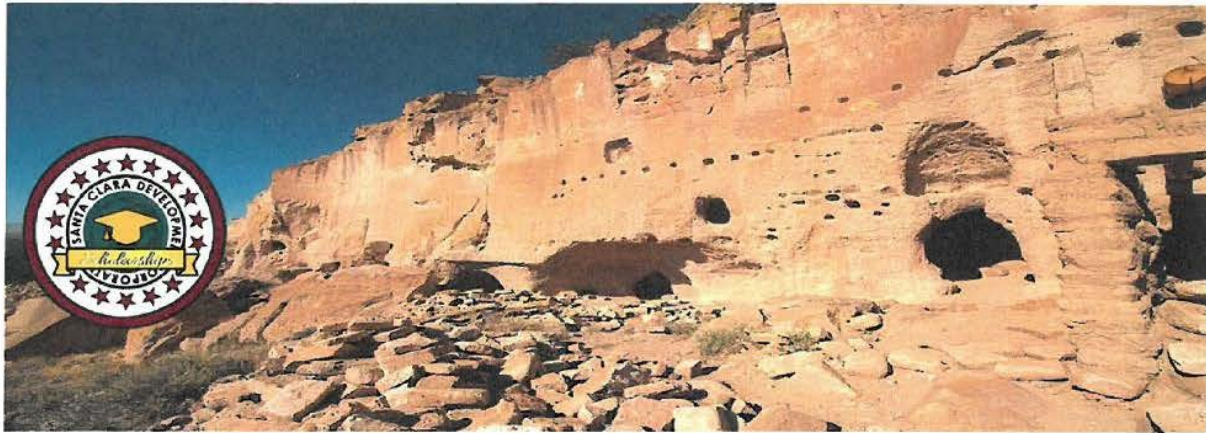
